**#2:** YUGOSLAVIA 1950. 9<sup>th</sup> Chess Olympiad. White FDC with RED First day chess postmark and complete set of chess stamps MB \$19

**#3:** YUGOSLAVIA 1950. 9<sup>th</sup> Chess Olympiad. Both RED and BLACK First day chess postmarks on a postcard with imprinted stamp MB \$7

**#4:** YUGOSLAVIA 1950. 9<sup>th</sup> Chess Olympiad. An envelope with address and RED First day chess postmark and a pair of 5 dinar chess stamps. MB \$9

**#5:** SAO PAULO, Brazil, Chess postmark, 19<sup>th</sup> Nov.1960. for ZONAL TOURN, on an air mail envelope gone through post. Checkmate No 80. MB \$29

**#6:** MOSCOW 15<sup>th</sup> March 1960. Black postmark for WORLD CHESS CHAMPIONSHIP BOTVINIK AND TAL, on a color view card with imprinted postage stamp. Checkmate No 71 MB \$9

**#7:** BADGASTEIN, Austria, 25<sup>th</sup> May 1946. Intern. Tournament, Chess postmark in 3 colors: black, red, and green. RARE! In Checkmate No 22 but there is NO black color!!! On blue envelope, somewhat stained. MB \$120

**#8:** AMSTERDAM, 19-22 June 1964. Interzonal Tourn. On SB also with regular postmark of 18<sup>th</sup> June. Checkmate No 111A. MB \$9

**#9:** VORONEZ, USSR, Pan Russian Chess Tournament, 6. to 24<sup>th</sup> June 1962 Two strikes of black postmark on spec. envelope. Also with red horizontal mark: "CLOSING DAY". MB \$7

**#10:** KOBENHAVN, Denmark, Chess postmark for European Team semi finals. On spec. envelope. 16<sup>th</sup> Oct.1967. Two machine strikes. Checkmate 189. MB \$6

**#11:** TCHELYABINSK, USSR, August 1975, Pan Russian chess single championship. Chess postmark in 5 different colors on 5 envelopes with also horizontal chess postmark, postage stamp and regular postmark. MB for complete of five \$12

**#12:** HERZEGNOVI, Yugo. 9<sup>th</sup> to 26<sup>th</sup> May 1954. Checkmate #42. European Women Zonal Tourn. on postally used postcard with arrival postmark. MB \$150

#17: USSR, 1963. 15 PERFORATED SETS of 3 stamps. Parts of sheets with side and upper or bottom white margins. MNH. MB \$15

#18: HUNGARY 1950 Candidates tournament. 8 sets (two blocks of four) – part of sheets with white margins. MNH. MB \$28

#19: LYBIA 1976 Counter Arab Olympiad in Tripoli. Block of four from upper left corners with two white margins. MNH. MB. \$14

#20: HUNGARY 1953. 1v 40 filer blue IN BLOCK OF FOUR-VERY RARE. MNH. MB \$9

#21: HUNGARY 1974. CHESS BUTTERFLY is on 60 filer stamp. Blk4 complete sets IMPERFORATED, corners of sheets with 2 wide white margins. Rare! MNH. MB \$39

#22: PARAGUAY 1978 Six sets (complete sheet plus Napoleon stamp. Sheets with chessmen on white margins, too. Only part of sheet is shown). USED. MB \$9

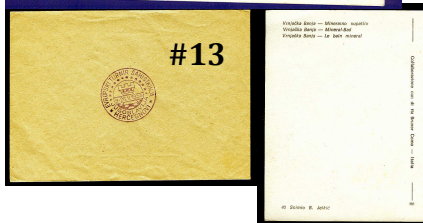
